

# Family Update Grow with us...

To the Beloved Disciples of Christ the Lord,

It is incredible how time has seemed to speed up. Since the institution of our Family of Parishes model, the workload for our Parish priests has increased significantly and that pace seemed to have sped up the overall pace of life. Weeks fly by and in the midst of that intensified velocity, I often wonder if our Parishes are still able to deal with the important day-to-day needs of the good people of our 6 Parish communities. We have recently had some major successes. We have just completed an extremely successful year of Faith Formation as our individual programs have blended together near seamlessly and as a result of our expanded offerings, enrollment went up 20%. More of our young people have been given the opportunity to grow in their Faith, and that is most encouraging as we travel this Road to Renewal. There have been other successes as well, such as the wonderful St. Joseph's Table held in March that saw over 200 people gather together to honor the Foster Father of Jesus.

With fewer priests assigned to our Parishes, one concern has been the challenge to ensure that our ministry to the sick is able to reach anyone in need. We have improved our emergency contact lines to make sure that Parishioners can reach a priest if they or a member of their family are in need of anointing and prayers. This is still a difficult task. Since the passage of HIPAA laws in 1996, hospitals are no longer contacting Parishes when people are hospitalized. The COVID Pandemic made hospital visits even more daunting.

If you are ever hospitalized and wish to be visited by a priest of our Family, it is your responsibility (most likely through a family member) to notify your Parish to arrange a visit. Also, remember that most hospitals (especially our fine Catholic hospitals) have a Pastoral Care Department to help take care of their patients' spiritual needs on site. It is not always necessary for someone from the Parish to visit, because the well-trained, professional Pastoral Care staff has already cared for the patient.

Even after 60 years since the Second Vatican Council ended, the Church has still not made our people comfortable with the great gift of the Sacrament of the Sick. No longer referred to as Extreme Unction (or Last Rites), this Sacrament should be offered to anyone facing illness and should not be delayed until one's health situation becomes serious.

Please do not wait until your loved one is in grave condition before calling for a priest.

With the fewer number of priests available, it may not be possible to find one at that time. If you have a family member in the hospital, call your Parish during regular business hours to put in your request for a visit from a priest. This should not be put off until the last possible moment. I know I find the opportunity to celebrate the Sacrament of the Sick to be a great personal satisfaction for me AND an immense source of God's Grace and comfort for the one who is ill. Our priests will respond as soon as possible. Sometimes it is still necessary to assure our older Parishioners that *a priest coming to anoint them is not necessarily a sign of the end of life.* The more we accept that belief, the easier it will be for us, all to find comfort in the Sacrament whenever we might need it.

We who are part of the Beloved Disciples of Christ the Lord are committed to maintaining a high standard of spiritual and sacramental service to the People of God. Even in the days of a diminishing number of priests, we strive to make spiritual care of the sick a priority. With our assistance, we will continue to bring the healing power of Christ to all in need.

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We are a self-produced magazine that is sent to the Bowmansville, Depew, Lancaster, & Cheektowaga areas.

St. Martha was from Bethany, a village not too far from Jerusalem. She was the sister of Lazarus and Mary. Often considered diligent and meticulous, she had quite the journey of Faith.

We hear of St. Martha three separate times in the Gospels. In St. Luke's Gospel, we hear the story of how she showed her anxiety and worry as she asked Jesus to tell her sister, Mary, to help her in serving. Jesus then responds that Mary is only doing what He asked, to follow and listen to Him. This story is meant to serve as a guide for us to understand how important the balance of our work and spiritual lives is. One is just as important as the other and both help us grow individually, as well as closer to God. With everything that worries and distracts us, with all we must do in our day-to-day, we cannot forget to spend time with God, and this story of St. Martha is the perfect reminder of that.

The second and third stories are found in the Gospel of St. John. The second story deals with the death of Lazarus and shows us how far St. Martha came in her Faith journey. In her conversation with Jesus, she shows great Faith and courage by saying that she knows her brother will rise on the last day and that Jesus is the Son of God. No doubt or hesitation. This is the moment that Jesus reminds us that He is the Resurrection and the Life, and that "everyone who believes in me will never die."

Jn 11:26

The third story sums up who St. Martha truly is. This is the story about how Mary anoints Jesus with expensive perfume. During the setting of the scene, there is one sentence about St. Martha. Simply stated, it says, "Martha served." In this story she takes back her original role, but in a happier, more at ease way. She shows us the way to live a truly Christian life balanced in Faith and service to others and reminds us that especially when in service, we do not need to be noticed or rewarded.

The liturgical memorial of St. Martha was begun by the Franciscans in 1262, who celebrated her feast on July 29th.

Saint Martha,
help us to overcome our distractions and
worries to listen closely to the Word and carry
God with us throughout our day, taking time to
spend time in His presence. Give us the strength
to be open to putting our needs aside
to serve others with wholehearted happiness.
Continue to remind us to be courageous
in our Faith and to constantly grow closer
to Jesus and the Father.

Attending events at other Parishes that are sponsored by our Family of Parishes offers us all the opportunity to learn how to grow together through being open to the changes and make new connections to build a new community.



Regardless of whether you've been away for years or just started struggling with your Faith moments ago, the true reality of God's gifts of love, compassion, mercy, and grace is that they are always available to you. Being there for and with God, choosing to be open to and embrace these gifts as a part of your every day, brings them to life in us. While these gifts are freely given and available to us all, we must work at our connection to Him to continue to respect and honor these gifts.

#### But what does that look like?

Although God is all powerful, He is also very personal and longs for a relationship with each of us. Just like we make time for our family, friends, health, and hobbies, we need to make time to spend with God too. He doesn't ask for much of us other than the opportunity to spend time together. Time with Him opens our hearts and minds to the knowledge that there is more to life than just us and our concerns.

Below are some easy ways to work on this connection with God:

<u>At Mass</u> – When we are at Mass, are we there to spend time with God and praise Him for all He has done or do we get distracted by something else? This is a special time when we not only can be in His Presence, but also have Him physically become a part of us.

<u>Adoration</u> – This is a way to spend time physically with Him in the Presence of the Eucharist. Whether it's a few minutes or hours, Adoration gives you that physical quiet space to focus on time with Him.

Contemplative Prayer & Meditation – This is easy to carry with you. You can do it anywhere, anytime, for any amount of time, and any reason. It can be structured or just you talking to God. Need some help? Try using a Christian meditation app like Hallow or Abide, finding a daily prayer (see the Laudate app), or the rosary. These can give you guidance and structure, while still offering you quiet space. If structured prayer does not work for you, just talk to God using your own words. That's prayer too!

**Bible Study or Discussion Groups** – These help you connect with others and talk through your connection with God.

Finding a mentor or starting Spiritual Direction – Sometimes we need other's perspectives to help us see the ways that God is working in our lives and what it means. Often, these are great places to start.

<u>Use a quote</u> – Sit and contemplate for a minute or two, possibly throughout the day, on a Psalm or quote from a theologian. Consider even writing in a journal what you think about the quote. *Hint – there's no right or wrong answer!* 

**Volunteering** – This helps connect you not only to others, but to God within them, and use the talents that God gave you.





One of the things we as Catholics learn at the beginning of our journey of Faith, especially around our First Communion, is the importance of the Mass and what happens during it. But, as we grow older, even though we might attend frequently, we replace that knowledge with other day-to-day information.

Frequently, those who convert to Catholicism or those that have a great change in their Faith do so because of growing deeper in their understanding of the Mass. So, to help us all continue to grow as a Family and individually in our Faith, let's take a look at the Mass in a new series. Breaking it down into its parts and offering insight into why this celebration is so essential to our Faith, covering topics like: What is the Mass and why do we celebrate it? Why do we have the opening prayers? Why do we have particular readings? What happens during Consecration? What items are used during Mass? What do the colors that we use mean? What keeps people away from this special celebration?

To begin, it is best to understand what the Mass is and why we celebrate it the way we do.

### What is the Catholic Mass?

The Catholic Mass is the central act of worship in the Catholic Church. It is a sacred ritual that commemorates the Last Supper of Jesus Christ with his disciples and the offering of his body and blood. The Mass is not just a simple gathering, but a profound encounter with the divine. It consists of two main parts: the Liturgy of the Word and the Liturgy of the Eucharist.

Catechism of the Catholic Church teaches: "The Eucharist is the memorial of Christ's Passover... not merely the recollection of past events.... In the liturgical celebration of these events, they become in a certain way present and real" (Nos. 1362-63).

This means that every time we celebrate Mass, we hear the Word of God through the Scriptures and encounter Christ, who is present there with us in the Eucharist. Mass gives us a way to connect directly with God.

# The Importance of the Catholic Mass

The Catholic Mass allows us to enter into communion with God. It provides a space for worship, reflection, and spiritual nourishment. It is through the Mass that we believe we receive the grace of Christ. The Mass is a source of spiritual strength, enlightenment, and a means of growing closer to God. The "source and summit of," or the reason for and best way for us to connect with, our Faith and God.

# The Structure of the Catholic Mass

The Catholic Mass follows a structured format that has evolved over centuries. It begins with the introductory rites, followed by the Liturgy of the Word, the Liturgy of the Eucharist, and concludes with the concluding rites. Each part has its own distinct elements and rituals that contribute to the overall worship experience that will be explored through the upcoming issues of this magazine.

# **SACRAMENT OF THE SICK**

The Sacrament of the Sick can be administered to any member of the Faithful in any state of illness.
It is not just for those near death.
It is also not limited to only physical illnesses.

#### **HOW TO ASK FOR THIS SACRAMENT**

This Sacrament can be requested at any time by contacting your Parish Rectory Staff and asking for a visit from a priest. To ensure that a visit can be made, please make a request well in advance. This should be offered to anyone facing illness and should not be delayed until the health situation becomes serious.

#### WHAT IF MY LOVED ONE IS IN THE HOSPITAL?





"O God, You search me and you know me. All my thoughts lie open to your gaze. When I walk or lie down you are before me. Ever the maker and keeper of my days."

Have you ever had a song stuck in your head? A song that plays and plays like an endless loop?

Recently, I was a chaperone to high school students on a religious pilgrimage to Italy. This song ("O God, You Search Me") kept playing in my head while we explored the history of our Church.

This hymn was written by one of my favorite hymn composers, Bernadette Farrell. It is based on Psalm 139. She also wrote "Christ, Be Our Light."

Italy is the keeper of so much of our ancient history. You can physically see the bones of St Peter. You can visit the Colosseum where so many martyrs were killed. You can climb on your knees the steps that Jesus walked (The Holy Stairs). Even the restaurants are sometimes built where you can see walls that date back to the early centuries of Christianity.

It's not surprising that we can become a little overwhelmed. You can really feel your smallness. In the sacrifices of saints and martyrs, all of my petty complaints were just that...petty and small. However, it wasn't just that. It was also a feeling of littleness. Of being a pebble in a vast ocean. I have to confess that I felt like a big nothing at times. I know my faults. Well... at least some of them. I wished that I was better. Holier. I was in a lot of pain from walking so my sense of seeing the humanity in people was not so good. I had discovered how easy it was to be critical when you're not feeling well. A priest told me that everyday you have to choose between loving people and being critical. You can't do both at the same time. Jesus wants us to love first. I felt bad about letting God down.

And yet this hymn kept playing over and over in my mind.

"O God, you search me and you know me... Ever the maker and keeper of my days."

God already knows our faults, our weaknesses. I'm amazed how he loves us in spite of it all. He is walking us through life, step by step. "Ever the maker and keeper of my days."

June and July might be a quiet time for most schools, but the Summer months are as busy as ever at St. Mary's High School.


A slate of summer sports camps runs throughout all of July and August.
